THE BALL IS IN YOUR COURT, AND IT HAS BEEN...

- What does it take to be successful as a coach and/or team?
- Do you hope things improve?
- Does wanting to win, guarantee success?
- What has to change?
- Do you develop new skills or continually use ones that are not working?
- How is that different/same for this church?
- Work on your Kingdom Concept
- Review the "Anatomy of a Revived Church"
 - *Re – read it and look at it from a different lens - what is it tasking leaders to do differently.
 - *Make a to-do list
- Commit to leadership training/spiritual training (HC)
- Commit to an outward mindset rather than an inward. Do some reading on this concept.
Consider reading, "The Outward Mindset" by the Arbinger Institute

IMPORTANCE OF LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

- You only grow at the rate that you are expanding your leadership capacity.
- Leaders must have the heart of God for mission. If you are going to lead, you are going to bleed (which takes heart)
- Clear understanding of what a mature disciple looks like and a clear process to help people get there. Without that, people learn to "play church"
 - *Think through how people are going to move from attendance to discipleship
- Always ask, "What happens next?"

Also, the Education Team is intentionally moving forward caring for children and youth in our community. There is room for you to join this team to bring hope and joy to the children of Oxford and beyond. I **invite** you to have a conversation with me about how your gifts, skills and abilities may be applied to advance God's purpose for Oxford UMC.

Again, thank each of you for all you do to enliven the Vision of your Church. Remember, there is a place for you to serve as you share and live out your faith with Christ who shows us the way!

Cynthia Mosely of Fordville, St. John UMC, Bridgeton, NJ, is excited about Native American Ministries Sunday. St. John's, a Native American congregation, is a vibrant community of 185 families (an increase of 50 families) that occurred during the pandemic as pastor Roy Bundy moved services online to support the needs of church members. With this growth, the church has also increased the amount of food they serve to the community in their immediate area.

“Perhaps its greatest benefit [of Native American Ministries Sunday], said Mosely, is the chance for “the general church family [to] learn and understand more about the Native American community right here in New Jersey. We share our drums, our dancers, our speakers, and our love of the Creator with everyone.”

We as a church body shared with her all the wonderful things we have been doing from an established prayer team to a children's ministry and community outreach activities. It was apparent that we have been working hard but still are not attracting people to Sunday church as we all desire.

Patty revisited the Kingdom Concept she initially shared with us and challenged us to discuss as a church body - "What is OUMC's unique calling?"


Patty educated us on the Mind, Heart and Feet model. This model suggests that if ideas and knowledge are just in the head, but do not reside in our heart, we will not move in the right direction, or in any direction. Our energy should be placed on intentional action that focuses on our unique calling and mission statement and not just great ideas and activities.

She advised us to read the book *The Outward Mindset* by the Arbinger Institute which focuses on the acronym SAM.

- S – **SEE** the needs of others and the challenges
- A – **ADJUST** our efforts to help each other and impacts on the greater good
- M – **MEASURE** and hold ourselves accountable

Patty's parting thoughts:

- Ultimately the ball is in OUR court and always has been.
- Our focus needs to be on God and His unique purpose for OUMC not on ourselves and what may make us feel good.
- She is here to support as needed and will continue to Pray for OUMC and our journey.




UMC Camping

Book Discussion Group



Do you enjoy reading? We do!!!

Our book group is always looking for more readers who like to chat with friends about books. We meet the second Wednesday of the month at 1pm in the Memorial Room.

Wednesday, May 11, 2022: *A Single Thread* by Tracy Chevalier. 1932. After the Great War took both her beloved brother and

her fiancé, Violet Speedwell has become a "surplus woman," one of a generation doomed to a life of spinsterhood after the war killed so many young men. Yet Violet cannot reconcile herself to a life spent caring for her grieving, embittered mother. After countless meals of boiled eggs and dry toast, she saves enough to move out of her mother's place and into the town of Winchester, home to one of England's grandest cathedrals. There, Violet is drawn into a society of broderers - women who embroider kneelers for the Cathedral, carrying on a centuries-long tradition of bringing comfort to worshippers.

Violet finds support and community in the group, fulfillment in the work they create, and even a growing friendship with the vivacious Gilda. But when forces threaten her new independence and another war appears on the horizon, Violet must fight to put down roots in a place where women aren't expected to grow. Told in Chevalier's glorious prose, *A Single Thread* is a timeless story of friendship, love, and a woman crafting her own life.

Wednesday, June 8, 2022: *The History of Bees* by Maja Lunde. England, 1852. William is a biologist and seed merchant who sets out to build a new type of beehive, one that will give both him and his children honor and fame.

United States, 2007. George is a beekeeper fighting an uphill battle against modern farming, but he hopes that his son can be their salvation.

China, 2098. Tao hand paints pollen onto the fruit trees now that the bees have long since disappeared. When Tao's young son is taken away by the authorities after a tragic accident, she sets out on a grueling journey to find out what happened to him.

Haunting, illuminating, and deftly written, *The History of Bees* joins these three very different narratives into one gripping and thought-provoking story that is just as much about the powerful bond between children and parents as it is about our very relationship to nature and humanity.

UMCOR Relieving Ukrainian Suffering

Working with three other aid organizations, UMCOR is collaborating to send medical supplies to Ukraine.'

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), the Arlene Campbell Foundation – a Texas-based humanitarian organization focused on Ukraine – and Ohio Health is collaborating to send 47,895 pounds of medical supplies and equipment worth \$935,000.00 to three hospitals in Kyiv, Ukraine. AEC Parcel Services is handling the transport of the supplies, which are being sent in three shipments.

The effort was put together by the Arlene Campbell Humanitarian Foundation, headquartered in North Zulch, Texas, which has links to health facilities in Ukraine. UMCOR is paying specific costs, including transportation, of approximately \$160,000. Ohio Health, a not-for-profit, charitable, health care ministry of The United Methodist Church, donated the supplies through a medical surplus program. UMCOR put the foundation in touch with Ohio Health and opened the door to the United Nation's Logistics Cluster to move the supplies into Ukraine after they arrived in Poland from the U.S. via chartered jet.

The first shipment arrived at the State Ukrainian Health Ministry Heart Institute in Kyiv on Thursday, April 14. The second shipment was shared between the Heart Institute, the Center for Pediatric Cardiology & Cardiac Surgery Clinic for Children and the National Specialized Children's Hospital, which is the nation's largest children's hospital, on April 20. The third shipment is scheduled to follow soon, according to Roland Fernandes, general secretary of UMCOR and its parent organization, Global Ministries. "UMCOR is pleased to facilitate both the procurement and the transportation of essential medical supplies to war-torn Ukraine," he said. "We multiply our own efforts and the generosity of our contributors when we engage in creative service partnerships."

Lena Denman, president of the Arlene Campbell Humanitarian Foundation, expressed appreciation of UMCOR for its role in the project. "The Foundation is honored to receive the support of the United Methodist Committee on Relief for our efforts to provide medical supplies and medical equipment to the State Ukrainian Health Ministry Heart Institute in Kyiv, Ukraine," she said. "This hospital serves not only Kyiv but also suburbs of Kyiv that have experienced mass atrocities. It was because of the support of UMCOR and its contributors that we were able to arrange transportation for these three shipments of vital medical supplies."

"This is the biggest shipment we have ever had," said Dr. Vitaly Demyanchuk, deputy director of the State Ukrainian

Health Ministry Heart Institute in Kyiv. "Every box contains useful supplies that give us the possibility of providing high-quality medical care to our patients, wounded individuals, and others in our area. We thank all of the American people. Together we are strong."

Playing a vital role in the transport of these supplies is AEC Parcel Services, a Chicago-based shipping company. AEC Parcel's long-established connections with key points and customs agencies on the Ukrainian border has made them one of the few shipping companies still able to deliver regular parcels and aid from the U.S. and Canada. When war broke out, AEC partnered with several international nonprofits to provide greatly reduced overseas shipping costs to Ukraine and other affected areas.

Items in the shipments include wound care/triage supplies, surgical kits and masks, examination gloves, mask respirators, varieties of hospital gowns, stethoscopes, sterile containers, and basic medicine.

The Arlene Campbell Humanitarian Foundation, founded in 2016, provides medical supplies for hospitals in Kyiv and helps facilitate physician training and research programs between U.S. and Ukrainian physicians. It continues the work of the late Arlene Campbell who, in 1989, started a not-for-profit agency called Russian Relief, one goal of which was to supply medical equipment and supplies to Ukrainians. The current foundation memorializes Ms. Campbell.

Ohio Health represents 35,000 associates, physicians, and volunteers, a network of 12 hospitals, more than 200 ambulatory sites, hospice, home health, medical equipment, and other health services in 47 counties of the state.

As part of the **General Board of Global Ministries**, the mission and humanitarian assistance agency of The United Methodist Church, UMCOR provides relief and recovery responses throughout the world. UMCOR is extensively engaged in services for refugees from Ukraine both inside Ukraine and beyond in the wake of the Russian invasion of late February 2022.
